Marking Policy for Wincle CE Primary School

The implementation of this policy is the responsibility of all members of staff.

MARKING

In marking the children's work, we aim:

- To promote a high standard of content and presentation in children's work.
- To communicate effectively to the children the appraisal/assessment of their work.
- To ensure continuity and consistency throughout the school in the marking of children's work.

Marking is part of the assessment of children's work and forms an essential part of the feedback to them. All marking, whether verbal or written should be objective led and should reflect the aims and purpose of the lesson. The objective of a piece of work should be made clear to the children at the start of the lesson and should be evident from the teacher's planning and marking.

Teachers will look at the pupils' work and mark using the following code:

- \checkmark = the child needs more work on this
- $\checkmark \checkmark$ = nearly there but some consolidation needed

$\checkmark \checkmark \checkmark =$ objective met

The main strengths and weaknesses of the pupils' work will be identified and worked on the following day for the first ten minutes of the next lesson. This will be called 'Feedback Time'. During this time, the teachers will focus on the common misconceptions with small groups of pupils.


Wherever possible, work should be marked on the same day as it is completed.

Children should not be given back books that are unmarked.

Teachers should use <u>black ink</u> when marking in both KS1 and KS2.

Marking written work

In KS2, technical errors will be indicated where appropriate as follows:



Upon completion of corrections, the class teacher or pupil will tick next to the symbol in the margin.

Book Organisation

To further enhance our independent, motivational and vocabulary rich teaching environments, we will be introducing a 'Thinking page' to our work books. This will entail using the left-hand page of each book for thinking and vocabulary work, which will lead into their written work, main activity on the right-hand side of their book.

We will be allowing the children to use any pen or pencil that they choose for their 'Thinking page' work, further boosting their motivation and enjoyment when exploring language and thinking/working more independently. The aim is to encourage children to build up word banks and become more 'language rich'

in their working within all subjects, not just English. We will also focus on the key spellings for the lesson and identify any spelling rules which are relevant.

PRESENTATION

GENERAL

- Children write in pencil in KS1 and, when ready, in KS2, a blue Berol Notewriter or a uniball pen, not biro.
- If children make a mistake, put a straight single line through it or use a rubber sparingly. Tippex should not be used by the children but may be used occasionally by teachers.
- Children should have opportunities to draft, proof read and edit their own and each other's work (on paper or on screen) before making a final copy (see above section on editing work).
- Children should write the date and learning objective at the top of the piece of work, underlined with a ruler.

As children progress through the key stages, they will be expected to present their work to an increasingly high standard.

ENGLISH

- Children should write the date in full, underlined with a ruler, by the left-hand margin.
- Children should be given time to reflect on and review their work and amend or improve work as requested. Any alterations they make once work has been completed are done in purple pen to evidence the editing and improving process.

MATHS

- All maths work should be done in pencil.
- Always put an abbreviated date i.e. 01.09.09
- Use a ruler when: underlining titles for answer lines graphs, drawing shapes and where straight lines are important.
- To number their work, put a small figure in a square followed by a full stop then leave a space.
- Leave appropriate spaces between working on squared paper only one digit per square.
- When completing vertical calculations, put the maths sign $(+, -, x, \div)$ to the left of the calculation.

Children should be given time to reflect on and review their work, and do corrections and amendments as necessary. Any corrections should be set out again.

HANDWRITING

- At entry, the pupils will work on printing each letter. When ready, the pupils will learn to write in cursive script. This will be taught in year one.
- Provision is made for an alternate cursive style to suit children with additional physical needs or children

arriving late on in KS2 who already have developed an acceptable style of handwriting.

• It is important that all staff write in cursive script and model it whenever they write on the whiteboard for the children.
